LINE NUMBERS RELEASED FOR DECEMBER PROMOTIONS

The Consolidated Base Personnel Office announced today the line numbers which would be affected in the December promotion cycle.

MINERS REMAIN TRAPPED

A chill wind swirled snowflakes around the entrance to a West Virginia mine shaft yesterday morning as the long watch continued for miners trapped below.

As the hours passed fears mounted for the 78 men entombed 700 feet underground since Wednesday morning.

Rescue workers have been frustrated in attempts to enter mine shaft #9 at Mannington W. Va., by fires touched off by six explosions since Wednesday. Mine officials said they could stop the fires by cutting off the oxygen feeding the flames but the move may suffocate the men.

In Bonn

10 NATIONS ATTENDING MONEY CRISIS MEETING

(AFNB) An emergency meeting in Bonn of financial experts from 10 Western nations on the European money crisis have been recessed for a few hours. The conferees met until the early hours of Wednesday morning. A West German spokesman said the only substantive discussion was on Germany's offer to use its current economic superiority to help the French Franc.

Germany was limiting its exports to France by raising duties and encouraging imports by lowering tariffs. The German move would support a plan to cut West Germany's export surplus by about \$1½ billion over 15 months.

German sources indicated that German conferees had expected other nations to come forward with plans to help the French. Other participants were said to have expected Germany to do more, such as advance the Franc as much as \$1 billion in credits.

During the session, 10 or 12 German students forced their way into the entrance of the meeting hall to express concern that Bonn might reevaluate the Mark upward. Bonn has said repeatedly it planned no revaluation.

France, German and British Foreign Money Exchange markets will be closed for the second straight day today.

POPE PAUL WANTS TO VISIT HANOI

The Vatican announced that Pope Paul VI wanted to go to Hanoi to encourage its Roman Catholics. And it said he would have done so had circumstances been more favorable.

The Pope made these comments in a letter written Nov 1 to the Archbishop of Hanoi and released by the Vatican yesterday.

LBJ, AGNEW CONFER

President Johnson conferred for more than one hour Wednesday evening with Vice-President elect Spiro Agnew. The president said he invited Agnew to the White House to review some of the problems of government and to discuss the duties of vice president. The president said a vice president's lines of authority and duties are not always clearly seen or appreciated by others. He added: "It is a high and responsible office and in recent years (cont'd in next col)

has taken on more duties. On world problems, the two took up Vietnam, the Paris peace talks, the monetary conference in Bonn and the Middle East.

Agnew said the president gave him an overall feel on what is going on in the world.

Nixon Meets Aides

President-elect Richard Nixon will hold talks with his top advisers today at Key Biscayne, Fla. A top Nixon aide had hinted of major decisions and important announcements.

U.S. CASUALTIES FALL TO LOWEST IN 5 WEEKS

American spokesmen in Saigon said U.S. battle deaths fell last week to their lowest point in five weeks, 127 dead and 1,031 wounded. U.S. spokesmen said the figures brought to 29,477 the number of Americans killed in Vietnam and to 185,633 the number wounded.
