2 U.S. OFFICERS KILLED  
IN GUATEMALA

(AP) Leftwing terrorist violence took the lives of two high-ranking U.S. military men in Guatemala City Tuesday.

Two other Americans were injured when terrorists opened up with machine guns on a car carrying the officers.

Killed were Col. John Webber of Houston, Tex., and Lt. Commander Ernest Munro of Rockland, Maine.

The U.S. Military Mission in Guatemala helps the country's government wage a campaign to root out Communist guerrillas infesting the countryside.

Observers report that feuding between Leftists and Right-wing vigilante groups erupts in violence almost daily in the central American nation.

The government suspended constitutional guarantees Tuesday after the two U.S. officers were killed. Police and Army patrols spilled in to the streets follow-

GEN. EISENHART & 10 OTHERS  
DIE IN KC-135 CRASH

Eleven of 12 persons aboard were killed yesterday when a jet tanker crashed and burned on takeoff from fog-shrouded Minot AFB in N. Dakota.

The dead included Maj. Gen. Charles Eisenhart, vice commander of the 15th Air Force at March AFB, Riverside, Calif. The plane was based at March and had left California Tuesday.

The only survivor of the crash was TSgt. William Wright, a flight steward. He was hospitalized but his condition was not disclosed.
